

Reading publications via the internet as an alternative to "hard-copy" has now become almost second-nature for many of us and we want to take this opportunity to raise awareness as to how, as a Society, we also have this covered. As a member of the MLFHS you can read "The Manchester Genealogist" online on the device of your choice. All the archive editions are online too and the complete archive can be searched by name, title and keyword.

If you would prefer to receive a link to the latest edition on the website as soon as it is published, instead of receiving a hard copy in the post, you can do so by following this route:

- Open the Society web page https://mlfhs.uk
- LOG IN as a Member to Manchester and Lancashire Family History Society Member Area (mlfhs.uk)
- This will take you to your own personal "Welcome" page.

- Scroll to the section headed "Your Personal Details" and the sub-section "Update your membership details"
- Select "Preferences". This is an important section of the web site because on this page you can select any or all of the Society Branches that you may be interested in. On this page though you can select to have your copy of the Journal as an electronic copy rather than a printed (hard) copy. Click "Submit" and it is done.



If you have made the choice to receive an electronic copy of the Journal then an email with a link to the Journal will be sent to you so that you know it is available as happens with the newsletters. However we do understand that many members may wish to continue receiving a printed (hard) copy of the Journal so there is no pressure to change. The choice is yours.

Exchange Journals: whilst on the subject of Journals and the Society web site, please don't forget the large collection of Journals (51 at the last count) that we exchange with other Family History Societies in the UK and abroad. A great way to broaden your family history knowledge, but more particularly, great if you have ancestors from any of those areas. National Library of Scotland: the latest issue of the NLS Newsletter has been received and it holds lots of interesting information and resource developments. There is also information about the free talks that are on offer, including one on Mary Queen of Scots and her relationship with France.
