

#### \*Family Tree Maker to be discontinued

On Dec 9<sup>th</sup>, Ancestry made the shock announcement that they will stop selling Family Tree Maker at the end of the month. They have pledged to support existing owners until 1st January 2017, but whilst this sounds like a long time away, it's only just over a year from now. Now, not surprisingly, all sorts of other software manufacturers are trying to attract FTM customers, but what is the urgency? The general consensus from "those who know", seems to be DO NOT PANIC. The only thing that is likely to disappear in Jan 2017 is the twitching leaves and merge feature between FTM and Ancestry databases. Those who have subscriptions to Ancestry and find records they want to transfer to their FTM tree will have

to do it manually rather than merge, but no data should be lost. Let's wait and see, but I suspect it is Ancestry who are now panicking by completely underestimating the loyalty and comfort zone of FTM customers. I do also find these comments from the excellent site "Genealogy in Time" also very perceptive, illuminating, and well worth reading.

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#### That's all folks, apart from two last items.

It is only maybe three months ago that I was remarking on how many new additions had been added recently to various families within our society. Now it seems we have sadly been hearing more about the other end of the life spectrum. I know in the last month there have been quite a few losses and the anniversaries of others. Can I just commiserate with those who have recently lost loved ones? We know who you are and I can share memories on if you wish. I will only name one, and Rita Greenwood has kindly volunteered to tell us a bit about him.

Mr. Alan Huth Haworth 1929-2015 "was a long-standing and supportive member of Bolton

FHS. He acted as Journal Secretary for a long time, sending timely resumes of our meetings to the Administrative staff at Manchester HQ for The Genealogist.

Alan's family history on his mother's side was most unusual. His grandfather George Huth was first heard of knocking on the door of the Liverpool Workhouse asking for permission to enter. He was on his own and eight years old. After staying only a few days at the workhouse, George was transferred to Kirkdale Industrial School and was billeted on a local family,

the Garners, in Oswaldtwistle. The family were very kind to George and he called his daughter after their daughter, Ellen. His only son William was killed in the First World War.

Alan tried all avenues to get a start in researching George's family background. He is on the 1881 census in Kirkdale Industrial School, the 1891 census, with the Garner family and in 1901 and 1911 with his wife Jane and the two children. On all censuses, George gave Liverpool as his place of birth.

On application to the Liverpool Workhouse records, Alan received a letter giving the information that George was the son of Charles and Blanche Huth and gave an address of a shop close to the Workhouse as the place he spent the last night before entry. No other concrete evidence of George's background has been found.

Alan wondered whether George's parents went to say, the U.S.A., leaving him behind and that perhaps their origins were in Germany, as Alan always felt at home in Germany, doing his National Service there.

One final twist in this story is that when Alan was at University in Liverpool, he realised that he was studying in the only part of Liverpool Workhouse still standing."

Maybe this is what family history research is about.

Remembering those who were here before us and carrying on with another generation.
