Personal History

Edwin BROADBENT was born at Ancoats, Manchester in 1893 the son of Robert and Rebecca BROADBENT nee CONLEY who were married 1882 at St. Philip, Manchester.

In the 1911 census the family were living at 7. Matilda Street, Pollard Street, Manchester,. He was aged 18 with the occupation of Lampwick Warehouseman.

In the 1901 census the family were living at 79, Branson Street, Manchester,. He was aged 8
Before enlisting he was employed by the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Company, Carriage and Wagon
Dept. at Oldham Road as a Lifter

Service History

He was living at Ancoats, Manchester when he enlisted in the King's Own Scottish Borderers at Manchester, Lancashire. and embarked for France on 9 July 1915. His last known address was Manchester, Pollard Street, Matilda Street, 10 (CWGC).

He is recorded as Died of Wounds on 25 April 1917 aged 24

He was awarded the Victory Medal, British War Medal & 1914-15 Star
