Personal History

Fred COCKRAM was born at Normanton, Leeds, Yorkshire in 1886 the son of James and Hannah COCKRAM nee CLAYTON who were married 1872 at St. Mary the Less, Allerton Bywater. His father died in 1913. His mother died in 1913.

In the 1911 census the family were living at 5, Westerman Street, Sandal, Wakefield,. He was aged 23 Railway Shunter

In the 1901 census the family were living at 11, West Street, Normanton,. He was aged 14 with the occupation of Solicitors Clerk.

In the 1891 census the family were living at Pullman Street, Normanton,. He was aged 4

He was a married man. His wife's name was Ada COCKRAM (nee SUTCLIFFE) They married at North Brierley, Wesrt Yorkshire on 29 March 1905

Before enlisting he was employed by the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Company as a Goods Guard

Service History

He enlisted in the The King's (Liverpool) Regiment at Normanton, Leeds, Yorkshire. and embarked for France on 14 April 1915. His last known address was Yorkshire, Wakefield, Sandal, Westerman Street, 5 (1911 Census).

He is recorded as Died of Wounds on 11 April 1917 aged 31

He was awarded the Victory Medal, British War Medal & 1914-15 Star
