### Try a spot of house history

### Re-imagine the impact of war

"The First World War changed Britain forever. **Germanic names** that appeared in the 1911 Census had been anglicised or abandoned by 1921. The Census reveals tens of thousands of men piecing their lives back together in institutions rather than family homes. For some, serious war wounds meant they had to learn new trades. Many children were orphaned or had new step-parents. 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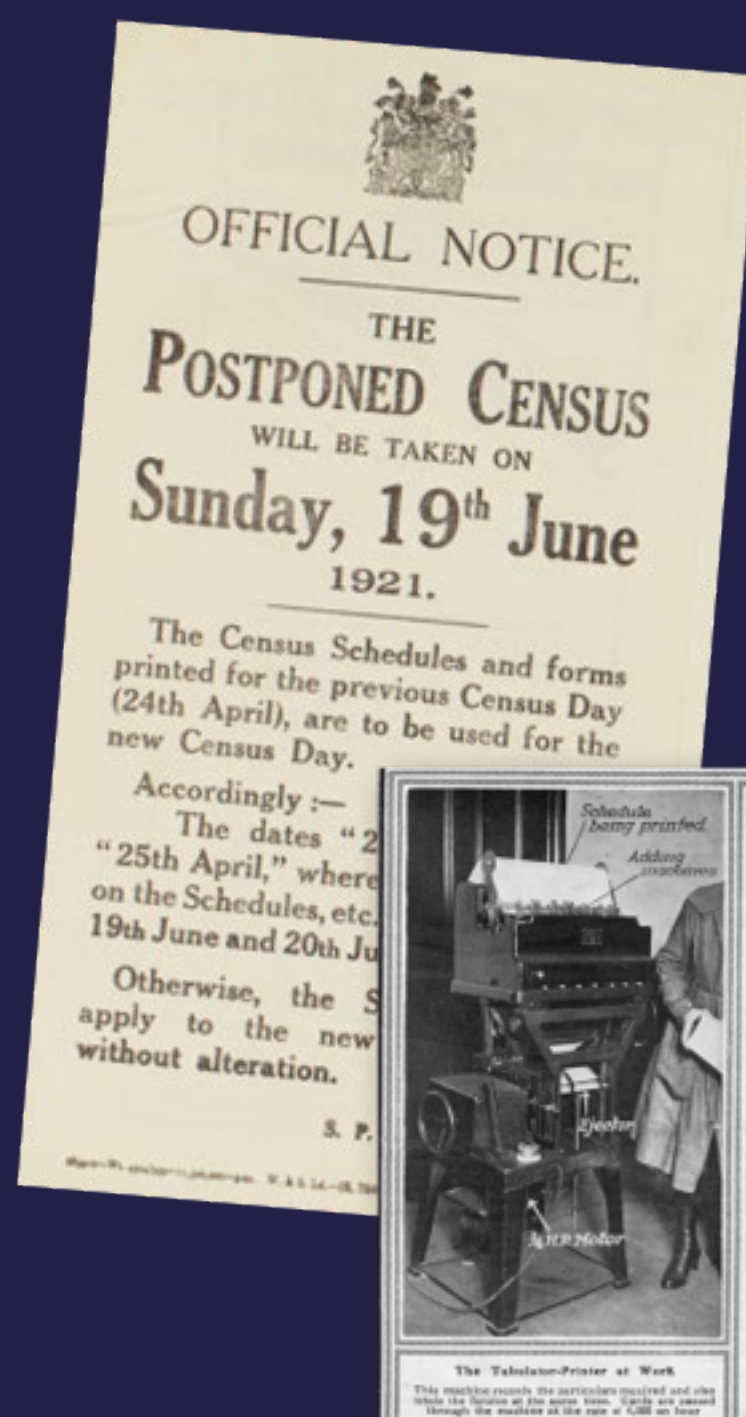

# Why is it important?

- **100** year closure rule for British Census records
- After the **1911** census, the **1921** census is possibly the last to be revealed in our lifetimes
- The **1931** census was destroyed by fire in **1942**
- No census was taken in **1941** due to the War
- The **1951** census will be released **1 Jan 2052**

**This gives us an entire generation of missing relatives!**

## Census statistics

- Almost 1 million never came home from WW1
- Those who came home weren't unaffected either - around 2 million returned with some level of disability
- 1.75 million more women than men (1,096 for every 1,000), this discrepancy was largest for those aged 20-45.
- A big increase (35% from 1911) in people in hospitals,  $\frac{3}{4}$  were men.
- Over 730,000 fatherless children vs 261,000 without a mother.






## Census statistics

- David Lloyd George declared that he would build a 'land fit for heroes' for those who returned from the war
- 13.7% of the population of England and Wales were living two families to a dwelling in 1921
- 6.1% were living in dwellings that had three or more families.

## THE CENSUS.

*How it is to be Taken*


*And the Machines which Render it Possible*

The first census since the war is to be taken on April 24; it is safe to say that this will be the most important yet made in British history. The war has cut clean across every branch of our national life," declares the official pamphlet issued by the Registrar General, broken up and distributed populations and violently upset all birth, marriage, and death rates, so that there is hardly a single question upon which we can look back to the last census figures for any guidance. In the work of enumeration some 38,000 enumerators will be employed in distributing and collecting the schedules. When these have been filled up and returned the work of compiling the statistics from them will be done at the London headquarters of the Census Office. (Until lately this building was used as the Lambeth Workhouse.) Some of the population figures will be extracted and published within a few weeks of census day, but the more detailed calculations will have to be obtained by a series of complicated operations in which various machines, large and small, some ordinary and some special, will be used as in the census of 1911.




**The Counting and Classifying Machines**

The process of classification is roughly as follows: First the staff will go through the papers and translate all the information into a series of codes, transferring such coded facts to cards—one card for each scheduled person. These cards will be fed first into the automatic puncher, which will punch the record as a series of holes in certain positions on the card, after which the sorting machine will in one operation sort the cards into twelve groups. Attached to the sorter is a multiple counter. This will be the first occasion that this machine has been available for a census. In it the card operates a counting dial instead of selecting a sorting bin, and the numbers in each group of cards, together with totals and sub-totals, are recorded without disturbing the order of the cards.



**How the Census Cards are Sorted by Machinery**

The unsorted cards are placed in at one end, and are sorted into twelve groups and counted by means of a number of discs in the machine

**Tabulating and Printing the Results**

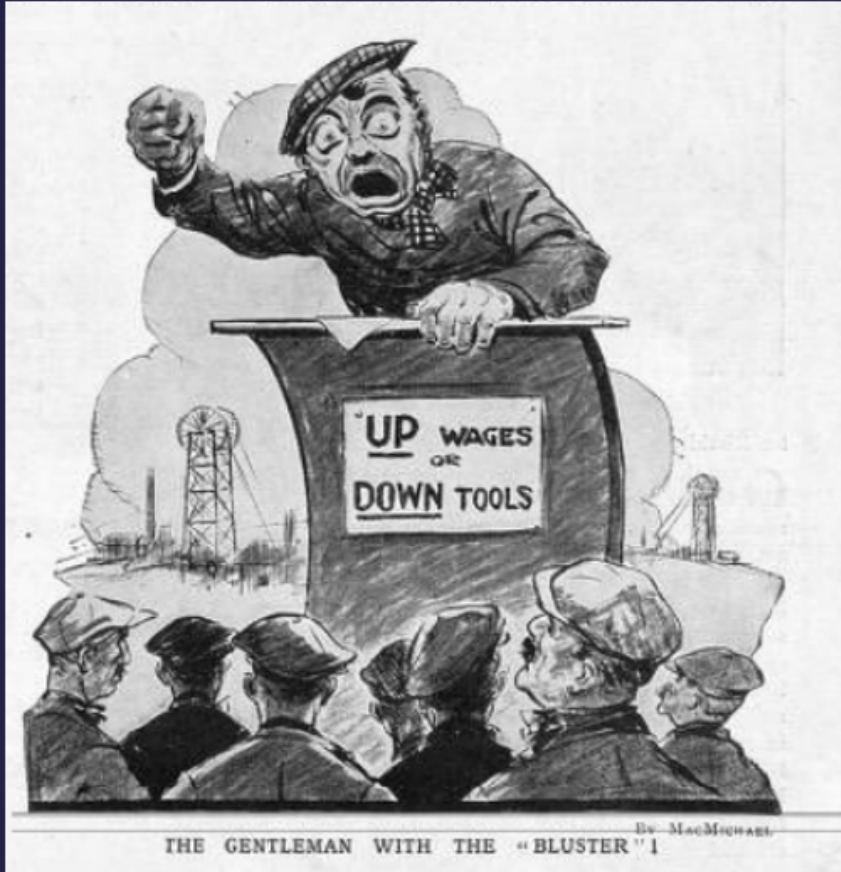
Next comes the tabulator, printer, into which the sorted cards are now fed and which now proceeds to give out the printed results on a sheet of paper, with the totals of each column shown at the end—this at the rate of 4,000 per hour. The particular appliances to be used for the census are lent and installed by the Accounting and Tabulating Corporation of Great Britain, of Southampton Row, W.C. By the help of these machines, this twentieth-century numbering of the people will be carried out much in the same way as a great deal of the accountancy and tables of railways, insurance offices, and banks have been

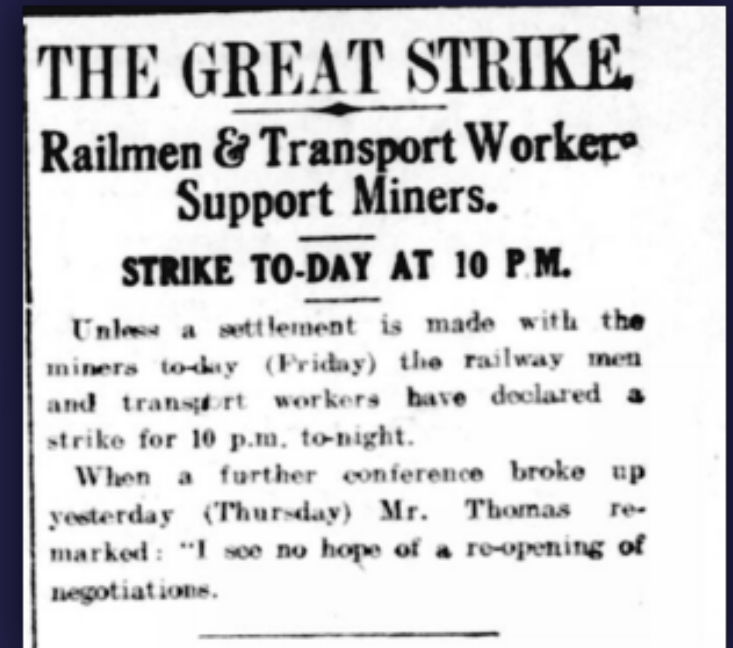

### NOTICE.

1. The Head, or person acting as Head, of a private Household is required by law to make a return in this Form, stating the particulars asked for in respect of all persons forming part of the household for Census purposes. See the heading to Column (a) within.

*N.B.—Any one or more persons separately occupying separate lodgings in a house or a separate part of a house will be regarded as forming a separate household. But boarders are to be regarded as part of the household with which they board.*

2. The Manager or other person in charge of a hotel, club, boarding house, or common or other lodging house, is required by law to make a return in this Form with respect to all persons falling to be included as inmates of the establishment for Census purposes. See the heading to Column (a) within.

3. Every such person is required by law to give to the person responsible for making the return such information as may be necessary to enable the return to be made. No use may, however, be made of such information by the person to whom it is given except for the purpose of making the return.

4. A person who has applied in the prescribed manner to make a separate confidential return will not be liable to give information to the Head or Manager; and in such case the person responsible for making the return will only be liable to include in his return in respect of that person the particulars required in Columns (a) and (b) within.

5. The Schedule will be called for on Monday, April 25th, by the appointed enumerator; in order that he may not be delayed it must be ready with the answers written in the proper columns early on the morning of that day. If the answers are incomplete or inaccurate, the enumerator must ask any questions necessary to enable him to correct the Schedule.

6. The person responsible for making the return may, if unable to deliver the Schedule to the enumerator personally, arrange for some other person to do so on his behalf. If desired, the Schedule may be handed to the enumerator under cover.

7. If any person whose duty it is to make a return or to give information refuses to do so, or wilfully gives false information, or uses otherwise than for the purpose of making the return any information given him for that purpose, he will be liable to a fine not exceeding **Ten Pounds**.

# Census questions

Housewives will receive special classification in the new schedule and will no longer be lumped in the great army of people of no occupation. Mr Vivian added that, as housewives work probably as hard as anyone, though not on the basis of remuneration they will describe their occupation by the term 'home duties'.

Stated that if **unemployed**, the name and the business of the last employer should be given, which the works Out of Work.

A great features of the present questionnaire was the **tightening of the inquiries regarding personal occupation**. A nurse must state whether she was a sick nurse, domestic nurse, hospital nurse, mental nurse, or the particular classification of her profession.

An **entirely new column** was under the heading of place of work, in which the address, whether at an employer's place of business, at home, or no fixed place, much be given.

It was hoped to get more accurate information as to date of birth by the alteration of the query as to age to in years and months. People had been too much in the habit of giving casual answers – if between 30 and 35 day, they put the round figure – and it was known from the returns of births and deaths that **the census returns of age were often inaccurate**.

**WOMEN AND THE CENSUS.**  
It is expected that the results of the inquiries in the census will supply, among other details, much interesting information on the widening of women's spheres of work since the war. Mr. Vivian, deputy Registrar-General, who is in charge of the census arrangements, said on Tuesday that many women who in previous returns came under the head of "drones" would now take their proper classification. Formerly the main division was one which classified those not actually paid for the work they did as among the "drones." "Without foreseeing the present industrial situation," added Mr. Vivian, "they had provided for it in the schedule, which stated that if unemployed, the name and business of the last employer should be given, with the words 'out of work.'" A great feature of the present questionnaire was the tightening of the inquiries regarding personal occupation. It was not sufficient to say "housekeeper," for instance.

# Top tip - household schedules

If the entry for the family you are looking at runs across more than one page of the household return, your purchase also buys access to the additional page or pages.

The same is NOT true of entries on institutional returns.

## Introduction

This table shows a selection of the larger institutions found in the 1921 Census of England & Wales.

In the majority of cases, these public and charitable institutions and larger establishments had 100 or more inmates (occupants) on census night in June 1921, and for the purpose of the census they were extracted from the Enumeration District (ED) in which they were physically located so as to constitute their own ED. However, we have also included a number of smaller institutions and other establishments which are of note but which appear alongside household schedules in regular EDs.

We have grouped the institutions by type or theme for ease of reference. Some institutions could have appeared in two or more of these groupings, so please try other sections if you don't immediately find what you are looking for. Within each grouping, institutions are arranged in archival piece order.

If you see an institution here of interest to you, you can search for it in the advanced person search screen by entering the Piece and ED number combination. You do not need to enter a name.

Alternatively, you can go to the 1921 Census browse (RG 15) and search for the Piece number there. Note, however, that often there are two, three or more EDs (and therefore institutions) in a Piece, so your browse could prove time-consuming.

# Army & Navy – families

On the census form the military and civilian population on a military base were separated into different pages of the 'NM' form.

The Military come at the start of the form. There is then an extra instructions page with 5 rows at the bottom for civilians, followed by civilian pages.

Look for the piece (book) number of the form that the husband was found in and then search in that piece using advance search for the **surname**. The wife/children may appear in the same book if they were living in the same military base/establishment/cantonment.

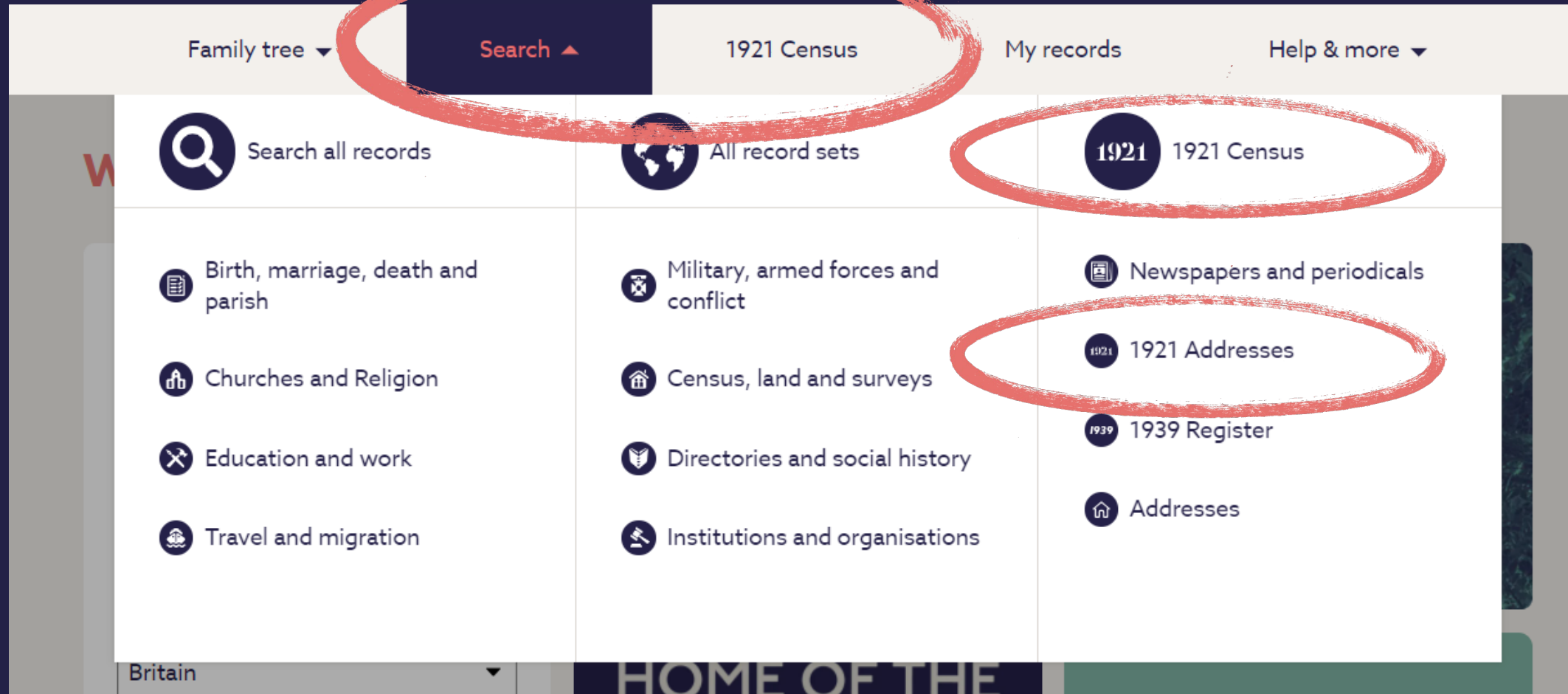



## Location, location, location

- **Parish** – Ecclesiastical parish and civil parish. Where 'parish' is used in the census documents without comment, civil parish will usually be meant
- **County** – Registration counties used for civil registrations and differ from ancient counties or the parliamentary counties
- **Registration District** – Superintendent's Registrar's District.
- **Registration Sub-district** – Each Registration District is divided into one or more sub-districts

- The 1921 Census includes the original census schedules, as completed in 1921. It also includes Plans of Division
- For the 1921 Census, there are **no** surviving Enumerator Summary Books (as seen in the 1911 Census) and no Census Enumeration Books (as seen in all the decennial censuses from 1841 to 1901)
- An enumerator was appointed for each of the 38,563 EDs – and supplied with a stack of blank schedules. They distributed from 11 to 18 June 1921

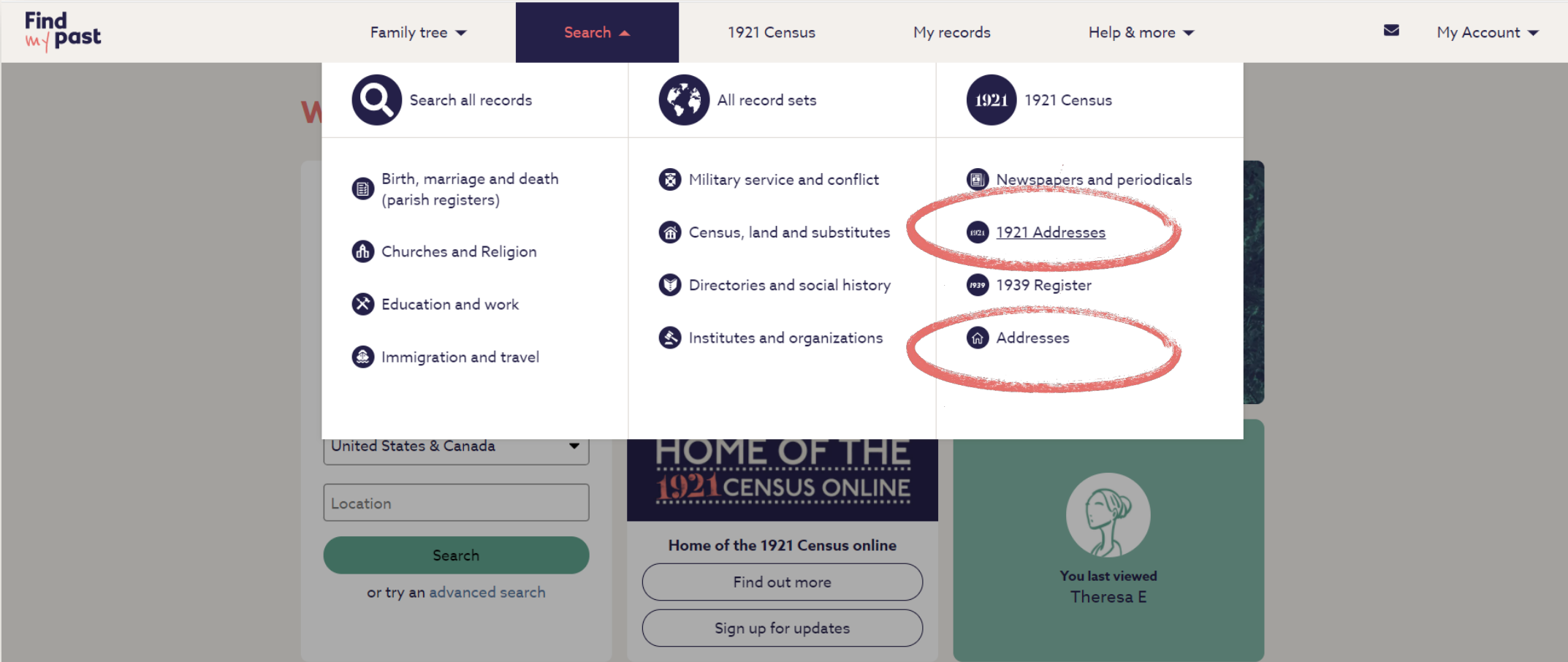

**Proportion of Families to Structurally Separate Dwellings.**—While the number of private families has increased by 7·9 per cent. during the decennium, the growth in the number of occupied dwellings has been at about three-fourths of this rate, or 5·9 per cent., with the result that the average number of families per occupied dwelling has increased from 1·01 in 1911 to 1·03 in 1921. At the same time the number of unoccupied dwellings has dropped from 6,198 to 4,962, a decrease of 1,236. With regard to the unoccupied dwellings it should be noted that the figures for 1911 and 1921 include both tenantless dwellings and premises merely vacant through the temporary absence of the occupier. It will be seen that a large proportion of the formerly tenantless dwellings must have been absorbed by 1921.

The meaning of the ratio of 1·03 families per dwelling is better appreciated from the following analysis of the total private families in these Counties :—
