#### A MESSAGE FROM OUR CHAIRMAN

Lots of talking points this month.

Pride of place goes to our tireless group of volunteers who, after many years of dedicated work, have put the last entries into the Index of Catholic Registers for the Manchester Churches. I congratulate Madeline Best and her team on this great achievement. You might think that they have earned a rest from their labours. Not a bit of it. They have recently resumed their work in Central Library and are already hard at work on the first entries for the Salford Diocese. Look out for the addition of this final tranche of indexes for Manchester once the necessary administrative tasks have been performed by the technicians.

Another group to be congratulated is the Census 21 organisers of the year-long programme of talks and events in preparation for the release of the 1921 England & Wales Census. The planned final presentation in January by Myko Clelland of FindMyPast was fully booked within days when bookings opened on Eventbrite. So great was the demand by members that Leslie Turner had to pull a few strings to arrange a second talk by FMP who agreed to add it to their already busy programme. This talk will take place in February, at which point FMP also agreed a recording will made available in the Member Area of the website for a short period afterwards. In this way we hope many more of our members will be able to take advantage of this special presentation. Well done to Leslie and her team for successfully delivering a sustained programme of events and talks on the same theme throughout the year.

It isn't often I get the chance to celebrate our Archives+ partnership with our friends in another Family History Society. That's just the privilege I had this month when I welcomed David Smetham and his party from the Family History Society of Cheshire to Central Library to observe our Helpdesk team in action and view the excellent facilities available to us in the Archives+ Hub. David and his team, along with Paul Newman, Heritage Officer of Cheshire Records Office left us mightily impressed by the wide range of functions available to us within the partnership. Foremost among these is our ability to collaborate with Manchester Archives and Greater Manchester County Records Office on all manner of preservation projects. Plus the facilities available to us at Central Library are second to none. In addition, collaborations with our other partners, the North-West Film Archive, and the Ahmed Iqbal Ullah Race Relations Library and Resource Centre and their University patrons enable us to enhance one another's projects and exhibitions with ease.

We now look forward to the release of the 1921 Census for England & Wales in January, together with the resumption of the full service of advice and guidance at our Helpdesk, with the prospect later in the year of details of the 1921 Census for Scotland becoming available. So good things to look forward to. I can't wait to obtain details of my parents' families in the 1920s- a time so different from today.

#### **PROJECTS UPDATE**

#### **UKBMD Updates**

Message from Ian Hartas, Local BMD Project.

A new Advanced Search page option has now been installed on all the Local BMD Project websites with links to it via the menu tabs at the top of each page.

This new search form will not replace the existing search pages but adds to the options that the user has, so if anyone wishes to use the current search forms they still can.

On the existing separate pages you can search for marriages, deaths and two types of birth searches, by surname or by mother's maiden name. The new page offers all four types of search in one combined form. Also note that the Order in which the search results has been enhanced to allow for easier analysis of the results, e.g. the "By year, Combined" option will, I believe, be very useful.

Here's a worked example for you to try:

On the Bath BMD advanced search page, working from top to bottom of the form, select "All" as the "Type of Search", enter a range of years of 1892 to 1898, enter SWIFT as the surname, STOCK as the spouse's surname, STOCK as mother's

maiden name and then select "By year, Combined" as the sort order option then press the Display Results button to action the search.

The results will then be displayed and I hope that you will soon spot that there's a family in the results. Starting at the top you will see the marriage of Thomas and Eliza, followed by the birth of Halstead, the death of Halstead, then the birth of two girls Emma Sophie and Amy.

There are other deaths intermingled in there, but they can be ignored.

Immediately below the results you will see a copy of the search form ready with the previous entries selected, ready for refining for a further search or for a new search - avoiding the need to use the back button that would have been needed with the other search forms.

As with the other search forms you have the option to add selected entries on to the Summary page where you can then proceed to order copy certificates.

All kinds of unique live music, radio and conversation are recorded on these tapes and discs. We've already lost many of the people captured on them. And the British Library estimates that we have fifteen years to preserve the sounds themselves.

That's why the British Library has received funding from the National Lottery Heritage Fund to establish Unlocking Our Sound Heritage, an exciting new national project to save thousands sounds which are at risk of being lost forever.

Archives+ is the hub partner for the North West region, which covers Cheshire, Cumbria, Greater Manchester, Lancashire and Merseyside. We'll be digitising around 15,000 recordings on 5,000 cassettes, reels and optical discs held all over the region here at Manchester Central Library.
