# Saturday 17th February, Anglo - Scots Meeting DNA, Double Helix History and The UK

## **Help Needed - Research on Mary Jane Rhodes**

We've had a message from Stewart who is searching for his grandmother, Mary Jane Rhodes. Mary Jane was the mother of Clara Rhodes who was born in the Bradford Workhouse in August 1880.

This is Stewart's message:

I am trying to unravel the history of my Great Grandmother, Mary Jane Rhodes (possibly, born Oldham on 30<sup>th</sup>. April 1851) and was wondering if any of your members have, or are, researched her?

My reason for asking is that her history does not appear straightforward and I would welcome a second opinion.

Firstly, the elements about which I am reasonably confident are:

Her mother was Nancy Rhodes (nee Whitehead) who married John Rhodes on 10<sup>th</sup>. July 1836 at Manchester in the church of St. Mary, St. Denys and St. George.

Nancy had four children; Mary (1838-1843), Nelson (1840), Joseph (1842), George (1849) and Mary Jane (1851

Mary Jane appears in both the 1861 (Waterhead) and 1871 (Prestwich-cum-Oldham) Census with her mother.

In November 1871 Mary Jane was sent to Manchester prison being sentenced to 4 months hard labour for her part in the theft of a shawl. She was released on 26<sup>th</sup> March 1872. The Prison records show George her elder brother of Waterhead Mill as next of kin.

**Wedding 1** - On May 6th 1872 Mary Jane married John Thomas Morris at Waterhead Parish Church, the witnesses being her brother Nelson and his wife Alice.

She has no father listed on the Marriage certificate (which would align with the Birth Certificate), whilst John Thomas Morris's father is recorded as Francis.

Secondly, those elements have some basis but are more circumstantial than proven fact.

**Wedding 2** - on February 8<sup>th</sup> 1874 John Thomas Morris marries Catherine Davies at Rochdale, his father being recorded as Francis. He is recorded as a bachelor suggesting it was his first marriage, rather than widower if his wife had died.

A search of the Census return shows; only one father/son combination with an age/location fit and that is the same John Thomas Morris as in Wedding 1.

No death records can be found for a Mary Jane Morris (or Rhodes), nor any records of the marriage being annulled. (In reality divorce was too expensive for most people).

There is no record of a Mary Jane Morris in the 1881 Census. Conversely, John and Catherine appear together in the 1881 Census (Wales), 1891 Census (Oldham), 1901 (Bury) and by himself in the 1911 Census as an inmate at Bury Workhouse.

This gives rise to a possible hypothesis.

Records for Mary Jane Rhodes (born Oldham April 1851) appear in the 1861 and 1871 Census only. However records a Mary Jane Rhodes (born circa 1852) appear in the 1881, 1891, 1901 and 1911 Census with a birth place of Bradford never having appeared in any previous Census (i.e. the 1861 and 1871 Census). Could it be the same person?

One possible explanation is she and her husband parted company and she went to Bradford under her maiden name, as gaining employment in Oldham would have been very difficult due to her prison sentence for theft.

Is anyone researching this MaryJane Rhodes? Could the Mary Jane Rhodes above of Oldham be the same Mary Jane Rhodes who gave birth to Clara Rhodes in Bradford?

### Findmypast adds Manchester burial and marriage records

Thousands of burial and marriage records covering parishes in the Diocese of Manchester are now available via Findmypast.

The collection includes 50,000 <u>death and burial records</u> from 1570 to 1990 and 913,000 <u>banns and marriage records</u> from 1570 to 1936, many of which are accompanied by images of the original records.

The records were obtained as part of a partnership with <u>FamilySearch</u>, where they are also available to view for free.
